## 'HOLLYWOOD NIGHTS' GALA IS STELLAR SUCCESS

The Episcopal Home Communities' third annual Gala on September 22nd, 2005, was an enthusiastic success for 325 party-goers who "reached for the stars at The Kensington." The event raised more than \$52,000 to aid residents in financial need.

Nearly 100 were residents from the three Episcopal Home Communities, with dozens of residents traveling in comfortable buses from The Canterbury and The Covington. Party guests enjoyed performances by Marilyn Monroe and Frank Sinatra look-alikes, music from their favorite dance eras, dancing with professional dance escorts, exceptional movie-themed food by Morrison's, and a star-studded silent auction. The interior of Bloy Center and two tents outdoors were decorated to reflect the mood of a spectacular Oscar party. Guests gave the evening rave reviews.

## THE CANTERBURY VOTED ‘SOUTH BAY’S BEST’

The Canterbury has been voted the South Bay’s Best Retirement Community by the readers of its newspaper, The Daily Breeze, published in Torrance, which represents readership from LAX to the L.A. Harbor. Readers were invited to vote on the best establishments in the South Bay area, and The Canterbury came out on top.

Consuelo Haire, Executive Director at The Canterbury for seven years, attributes the success of The Canterbury to a combination of carefully orchestrated regular events. “We have annual satisfaction surveys for both our resident body and our employees,” said Ms. Haire. “We take these opinion polls seriously, and they drive the efforts of management and staff. We assess the expectations of residents and their families, and the goal is always to exceed those expectations. The physical environment is updated periodically to meet the various needs of residents, which evolve every five or six years. In fact, The Canterbury currently is involved in the initial stages of a comprehensive master plan based on the latest market research, and the design features will reflect the anticipated standards of retirees in the next five to ten years. The master planning process is being done under the auspices of one of the foremost architectural design firms, whose successful retirement communities have gained national recognition.”

A recent market survey conducted by Gerontological Services for The Episcopal Home Communities confirmed the Daily Breeze’s assessment by its readers; survey results indicated that 95% of the response rated The Canterbury’s reputation as excellent.

## COMMUNITIES RESPOND TO HURRICANE KATRINA DISASTER WITH \$24,000 TO ERD

Residents, staff and friends of The Episcopal Home Communities contributed \$24,035 to Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) to be directed to its relief efforts in the Gulf States. Sixty-two gifts were collected during the month following the August tragedy caused by Hurricane Katrina in Louisiana and Mississippi.

President and CEO Martha L. Tamburrano said, “this terrible natural disaster touched the hearts of everyone in our organization. Many of us wanted to

contribute to a fund to help the victims, and ERD’s expertise in rebuilding communities in such times of tragedy is outstanding. I am so proud of our Episcopal Home residents, staff and friends, in reaching out to help those outside our immediate family. We know ERD will direct the \$24,000 to the areas of most need in the Gulf area.”

Earlier this year, The Episcopal Home Communities sent \$18,085 contributed by its residents, staff and friends to ERD, to be directed to disaster relief in South Asia following the tsunami last December 26th.



## TIM WETZEL IS NEW VICE PRESIDENT OF OPERATIONS FOR THE COMMUNITIES

**T**im Wetzel has succeeded Marty Tamburrano as The Episcopal Home Communities' Vice President of Operations, following her promotion to the President and CEO position. Mr. Wetzel relocated to California from Michigan to assume his new responsibilities. "It is good to be back in sunny California and closer to family," he said. "I am delighted to be working for an organization that is non-profit, church-related and mission driven."

Wetzel last served as Associate Executive Director at Erickson Retirement Communities in Novi, Michigan.

Erickson is a new community, which will have 2300 residents and 1000 employees once it is completed. He previously worked as a Senior Consultant for Deloitte & Touche and as Executive Director of Horizon House, a Seattle retirement community with 480 residents. He holds a Master of Business Administration from Arizona State University, a Master of Information Systems Management from Seattle Pacific University and a B.S. in Biology and Psychology from Heidelberg College.

The Vice President of Operations reports directly to the President and CEO Marty Tamburrano. "Tim has worked in single-site communities that are much larger than any one of ours, so I was excited when he emerged as a candidate for my former job," she said. "In just three months, he has delved in, developed good working relationships with our employees and really understands our organization. He also did a great job of filling the Executive Director position at The Covington, an enormous first task! Tim brings

## DON SHAWLER IS NAMED NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AT THE COVINGTON

**D**on Shawler joined The Covington in September as its new Executive Director. Mr. Shawler has been employed in the residential healthcare industry for more than three decades, most recently at the Chateau Lake San Marcos, a community in San Diego County not dissimilar to The Covington. Prior to that assignment, he managed a 600-resident community in Pennsylvania as well as The Peninsula Regent in San Mateo. He earned an M.S. degree in Gerontology, with concentration on Retirement Housing Administration, from North Texas State University,

and also served as a Captain in the Air Force.

"I've known Don for many years," said VP of Operations Tim Wetzel. "And I have great respect for his method of management. He practices MBWA, Management by Wandering Around, which should be just the right recipe for administering at The Covington. We think that both he and the residents will be happy with this match."

Shawler says that he was attracted not only by The Episcopal Home

Communities' reputation, but also because he has known VP Tim Wetzel for many years of crossing paths in their respective careers. Since he still lives a formidable commute away in San Diego County, he has been spending a night every week in a guest room at The Covington, which gives him an opportunity to visit with residents at dinner and at breakfast at the Marketplace. "A big part of my job," he said, "is to listen to the residents. I also want to be able to deliver to them, before the honeymoon is over! I inherited a good staff, so I think we are off to a great start."

# DISASTER PREPAREDNESS A PRIORITY AT OUR COMMUNITIES

Even before the horrifying disasters that have unfolded worldwide in the past year, The Episcopal Home Communities was revamping its disaster preparedness programs.

President and CEO Marty Tamburrano coordinated the revision of our disaster plans (while she was Vice President of Operations). “The security and safety of our residents is paramount,” she said. “There are, of course, laws about disaster preparedness for facilities like ours, but we are subscribing to a long-term, regular program that should relieve the anxieties that our residents and their families have about extraordinary events. We are taking a very proactive stance on this issue.”

The training aspect of preparing for emergencies is the focus of Fire & Disaster Training Services, owned and operated by Urban Paulus from San Dimas, California. Fire & Disaster Training Services is a Fire/Disaster Safety Consulting Firm serving Los Angeles, Orange, Santa Barbara and San Diego Counties. Since 1987 the company has served as training consultant to acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, assisted living facilities, residential care facilities, and other organizations that are concerned with staff fire and disaster training.

At The Episcopal Home Communities, the process involves evaluation of the organization’s current plan, followed by recommendations for updating the plan to yield the highest efficiency possible. Then, a training

schedule is implemented, which includes educating both staff and residents. Of particular interest to residents and their families is a list of recommended items for each individual’s Disaster Kit (see adjoining box).

“It is not always the case that there is a problem in the procedures, but more often than not, an alert staff can think of ways to function more efficiently in an emergency,” said Paulus, who has 35 years of experience.

Mr. Paulus began campus training at The Covington in October 2004, followed by The Canterbury in February 2005 and The Kensington in October 2005. Now his schedule includes at least two visits per month to each community. On a sample day (or night), Paulus might perform, for example, an unannounced fire drill in one of the buildings at a Community. After the drill, a meeting is held with the staff, to critique and review, with an aim of working to make it more organized.

Management at The Episcopal Home Communities and Urban Paulus agree that there is always room for improvement and refinement. The plan is designed to make residents feel very secure in any situation and relieve the worry of their families, who do not always live nearby.

## FATHER RON ERLANDSON ACTIVE IN NUMEROUS AGING SERVICES PROGRAMS

**T**he Rev. Ronald Erlandson, Director of Pastoral Services and a member of the Episcopal Home family for 11 years, is spreading the benefits of his expertise among neighboring parishes and organizations in the Southland.

As a member of the Bishop's Commission on Older Adult Ministry for the L.A. Diocese, he has served as its Chair and currently links that group to another, by serving as the Commission's liaison with the Ecumenical Network on Spirituality and Aging (ENSA). ENSA sponsors and conducts workshops and conferences on all aspects of aging services, and The Episcopal Home Communities co-sponsors some of the group's events. Father Ron also is active in the California Coalition for Caregivers, which advocates for caregiver-friendly policies and programs and increases public awareness.

His involvement in these groups dedicated to enriching the lives of seniors by celebrating the wealth of their experiences coalesces with his on-campus programs, which have gained momentum since his appointment as Director of Pastoral Services for The Episcopal Home Communities. Prior to 2005, Father Ron served as Chaplain at The Kensington, a position now held by the Rev. Sally Monastiere. The Rev. Catherine Keyser-Mary is Chaplain for both The Canterbury and The Covington. As Director of Pastoral Services, Father Ron explains, "I am asked to oversee the spiritual concerns of all three of our Communities, with the Chaplains and Executive Directors. We must assess and meet the spiritual needs of campus residents and employees, really the entire Episcopal Home community, at any and all levels. I also represent the entire organization in outside spiritual eldering programs." Father Ron currently leads three on-campus programs.

The Guided Autobiography Program, which originated at The Kensington last year, was inspired by the work of Dr. James Birren at UCLA's Center on Aging. Guided Autobiography, he explains, "is a process of life review that is especially useful to people going through transition, which can mean retirement or moving into a retirement community. Through guided self-reflection, we grow to recognize the patterns that emerge in our lives. It is done thematically, rather than chronologically, with writings on nine topics, all of which

stimulate thought about events that may have changed the course of one's life. It provides us with a wonderful legacy for our children and friends." The popular program has been presented three times at The Kensington and is in the future plans at The Canterbury and The Covington as well. "From Age-ing to Sage-ing" is based on a program inspired by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi and his book of the same name. Father Ron says, "This program enables participants to turn aging, the simple biological process, into sage-ing, which is a harvesting of the wisdom gained in their lives. One reaches awareness that aging can be the most significant piece of the life cycle, and its wisdom can be wonderfully communicated to both younger and older people." The Age-ing to Sage-ing workshop has been held at both The Kensington and The Canterbury, as well as at St. Mark's Church, Altadena, and St. Gregory's Church, Long Beach. It has become so popular that a second round is scheduled at St. Mark's, and an inaugural workshop has begun at St. Edmund's in San Marino. The Reverend Judy Turberg, from the Diocesan Commission on Aging, conducts the program with Father Ron.

Stephen Ministers play a significant role as volunteers at The Kensington campus. Father Ron oversees the training for this volunteer program, whose members become spiritual companions to residents, visiting them regularly and meeting bi-monthly for ongoing supervision.

Father Ron's on-campus programs enrich the spiritual lives of the resident, while his extensive involvement in area groups as a representative of The Episcopal Home Communities extends his ministry beyond the walls of one organization, to serve the spiritual needs of others in the broader community.

One of Shawler’s immediate additions to The Covington is his Sit and Chat Session. The purpose of his Sit and Chat is to give residents the opportunity to meet face to face and raise questions, bring forth issues for discussion and even extend compliments to the staff. Not agenda-driven, these small, informal meetings are designed to promote communication.

A zealous mountain climber since age nine, Shawler is an explorer, whether it be the wilderness or retirement communities. Having completed the Sierra Club Wilderness Basics Course twice, he is a proven survivor as well. Just as he pushes his personal limits, he intends to challenge the residents at The Covington, by developing and promoting programs to serve them. His bookcase of tomes on all aspects of aging attests to his dedication to enhancing the quality of life for the seniors. At The Covington, he wants to look back each year and count his accomplishments, and it seems he will stimulate the residential program to new heights that parallel his own mountains.
